CSA Farms Apply Today and Connect with New Markets through Employer Partner Wellness Programs

KY Farm Share Coalition (KYFSC) is now accepting applications from produce CSA farms interested in joining the coalition for the 2023 season. KYFSC works with employers who want to offer a CSA incentive on a weekly local, organic vegetable box to their employees as a workplace wellness benefit. The program focuses on increasing access to fresh healthy foods for Kentuckians and stabilizing revenue for organic farms. In 2022, KYFSC worked with 16 employers to promote CSA opportunities, partnered with 7 CSA farms, and offered over 1000 workplace CSA vouchers to put towards CSA. In addition to coordinating the workplace CSA program, KYFSC offered 6 CSA chef demos, a CSA cooking class, and helped coordinate a spring and fall CSA promotion to spread the word about how to best store, cook, and use a weekly CSA share!

Applications are reviewed on a rolling basis and due by December 2, 2022, to participate in the 2023 season. KYFSC Endorsed Farms must offer USDA certified organic produce shares for a minimum of 20 weeks. Farms can also be in documented active organic transition. 2022 Census of Agriculture is coming

US Farm Policy is formed with input from you, Kentucky's Farmers. Let your voice be heard and participate in the 2022 Ag Census. Don't forget, the ag census includes every operation – large or small, urban or rural – from which \$1,000 or more of

agricultural products are produced and sold, or would normally be produced and sold, in the ag census year. A complete count, with every producer getting and taking the opportunity to be represented in the data, is vital. The data not only influence business and supply chain logistics, they inform policy and program decisions that directly impact producers, ag operations, and communities across the United States. Humane Farming Mentorship Program

FACT's Humane Farming Mentorship Program is for beginning livestock and poultry farmers seeking personalized guidance from an experienced farmer on business strategies and management practices. It is designed for farmers who wish to raise their animals on pasture using sustainable, humane practices. FACT is currently accepting applications from farmers who wish to participate as mentees and mentors. The cost to be mentored is \$200 (a limited number of partial scholarships are available). Farmers who serve as mentors will be compensated \$500. Additional funding is also available for travel and conference scholarships.

Livestock & Poultry Farmers: Apply for a Fund-a-Farmer Grant from FACT Deadline January 10, 2023

Food Animal Concerns Trust (FACT) is now accepting Fund-a-Farmer Grant applications. Grants of up to \$3,000 are available for livestock and poultry farmers to improve and expand pasture for their animals, as well as those who are seeking or who already hold one of three animal welfare certifications.

A Guide to USDA Resources for Historically Underserved Farmers and Ranchers

This new multi-agency guide for USDA assistance for underserved farmers and ranchers, is available online from USDA. If you are a farmer or rancher and are a minority, woman, veteran, beginning, or limited-resource producer, you can use this 40-page booklet to learn about assistance and targeted opportunities available to you. This includes programs offered through the Farm Service Agency, Natural Resources Conservation

Service, and Risk Management Agency. The guide is also available in Spanish, Hmong, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, and Chinese.

USDA announces assistance for on-farm food safety expenses for specialty crop growers

Application period opens: June 27, 2022

Specialty crop operations may receive assistance for the following costs:

- Developing a food safety plan for first-time food safety certification.
- Maintaining or updating an existing food safety plan.
- Food safety certification.
- Certification upload fees.
- Microbiological testing for products, soil amendments and water.
- Training.

Silvopasture and Forest Farming Support / Funds Available

The Catalyzing Agroforestry Grant Program is focused on implementing silvopastures and forest farming practices through direct support payments and will assist producers in designing appropriate projects using technical assistance and science-based planning strategies. The ultimate goal of the effort is to increase ecosystem sustainability and diversity by scaling up agroforestry practices. The Appalachian Beginning Forest Farming Coalition (ABFFC) project will provide up to \$1500/acre for silvopasture implementation and up to \$1000/quarter acre for forest farming implementation depending on project scale and scope. To enhance shared learning, producers who receive support will share successes and lessons-learned with their peers and other interested stakeholders. Minority, female, Indigenous, LGBTQ+, and/or socially disadvantaged farmers are highly encouraged to apply.

USDA Offers Assistance to Protect Privately-Owned Agricultural Lands

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) encourages people and groups wanting to protect agricultural lands to consider enrolling their property into conservation easements.

The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program – Agricultural Land Easements (ACEP - ALE) focuses on protecting and conserving productive agricultural lands. Landowners are compensated for enrolling their land in easements. <u>Partners include state or local agencies and certain non-profits</u>. Eligible lands include privately owned cropland, pastureland and forestlands. Landowners do not apply directly to NRCS for funding under this program. Applications from eligible entities for 2023 ACEP-ALE funding must be received by December 1, 2022 to be considered for the current funding cycle. Landowners who wish to be considered for ACEP-ALE must make application to an eligible entity. Entities interested in agricultural easements should contact their <u>local USDA service center</u> or visit the <u>Kentucky NRCS ACEP-ALE website</u>.

Slow Food Bluegrass Garden Grant Deadline: ongoing

Slow Food Bluegrass micro-grants support groups in Kentuckiana who foster education about and access to good, clean, fair food. KSU Small Scale Farm Grant

Deadline: The 1st day of every other month

Funding Amount: Up to \$5,000 for farmers, \$15,000 for groups benefiting multiple farmers Eligible Entities: Kentucky farmers and Kentucky agriculture groups including farmers markets

Overview: The KSU Small Scale Farm Grant is designed with the small operation farmer in mind. This grant application is relatively simple to complete and the funds can be used to purchase needed equipment related to the proposed project. To qualify, applicants must be producing a value-added product, be an organic farmer, and/or be an aquatic farmer. Farmers markets are often eligible. Previously approved projects have included canning equipment, a walk-in cooler, a water line to a hoop house, a root cellar, a cool-bot for vegetables, and a trailer for keeping meat cool. **Did you know that the recently added farmer education assistance with a maximum of \$500 can be used for #OAK2023? Apply now, Deadline is December 1, 2022.**

Kentucky Proud Promotional Grant

Deadline: On-going

Funding Amount: Up to 10% annual gross farm income, max at \$8,000 per year; \$1 for \$1 match

Eligible Entities: Kentucky farmers and agribusinesses

Overview: The Kentucky Proud Promotional Grant is a cost share program to help Kentucky farmers and agribusinesses pay for advertising and marketing expenses. The award amount is based on 10% of direct farm impact; for a farmer it would be 10% of their total farm gross sales. The applicant must be a registered member of Kentucky Proud to apply and use the Kentucky Proud logo/brand in marketing efforts paid for with program funds. Examples of fundable items include TV ads, radio ads, web expenses, hats, t-shirts, demos, sampling, labels, packaging, tradeshows, UPC, and bar codes. This is a great program that helps promote our local farms!

ON-Farm Energy Efficiency Incentives Program

Deadline: Applications are accepted year round

Funding Amounts: 50% cost share - up to a \$10,000 incentive, plus \$150 for an approved third party energy audit

Eligible Entities: Kentucky farmers with a gross farm income of at least \$25,000 Link: <u>https://agpolicy.ky.gov/energy/Pages/default.aspx</u>

Overview: The Kentucky Agricultural Development Fund offers an On-Farm Energy Efficiency Program to help Kentucky farmers with energy projects. These cost share funds are available to increase on farm energy efficiency and to support renewable fuel production projects. The applicant is required to have a third party energy audit completed. This program can be combined with the USDA-NRCS Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) to get up to 75% of a total project cost covered.

Rural Energy for America Program - Grants and Guaranteed Loans

Funding Amount: \$1,500 to \$500,000 (25% of the total project cost) Eligible Entities: Farmers and rural businesses

Overview: USDA Rural Development offers REAP grants and grant/loan combos to help agricultural producers and rural businesses install renewable energy systems and do efficiency upgrade projects. A grant only application can pay up to 25% of total project costs. A grant/loan combo can fund up to 75% of total project costs. Guaranteed loan only applications do not have an application or funding deadline to be processed. Some project examples include: lighting efficiency, heating efficiency, bio-energy, solar energy, and dairy ventilation upgrades. An energy assessment or audit is required as part of the application process. If you are interested, you need to inquire as soon as possible. The October 31 due date prioritizes "restricted" or smaller projects that have total project cost of \$80,000 or less (and are requesting \$20,000 or less in grant funds). Fall is the best time for small projects to apply!
